

Class B Farm Produce and Fruit

This class is open to Box Butte County products only and must have been grown this season. Entries due Wednesday of fair week 8 a.m. - 3 p.m., with judging to begin at entry closing.

Purple ribbon and blue ribbon premium paid on competitive exhibits. Premiums to be paid on practical farm and garden products adapted to this county according to the judge's decision. The main points to consider in picking out your show examples are as follows:

Quality, uniformity, color, freedom from disease and to some extent, size. Tomatoes should be uniform size, good color, free from growth cracks, no rot and should be firm. Beans should be uniform in size, good eatable, not too ripe or hard, free from disease, true to variety and good color. Beets should be good eatable quality, 2 to 22 inches in diameter, free from growth cracks, tops should be cut off, all dirt brushed off, and good even color. In onions, size is the main factor, should be free from dirt. Peas should be good quality, uniform in size, well filled, free from disease. Cucumbers for pickling should be 2 to 4 inches long, good quality, uniform in size, free from disease and should be brushed, not washed. Slicing cucumbers should be 6 to 8 inches long, good quality, uniform in size, free from disease and should be brushed, not washed.

Adhere to instructions given under each lot number. Containers will be furnished for all exhibits requiring them in Class B.

A total of \$350.00 will be allotted this division to be awarded as the show warrants, maximum purple ribbon award \$2.00 and maximum blue ribbon award \$1.50 in all lots. Winners must pick up premium money from the Fair Office (West Window Only)
